COTTESLOE'S right to reject the proposed redevelopment of the Cottesloe Beach Hotel under the terms of the Town Planning Scheme will be considered by the Supreme Court. The hearing is likely to be brief, but because of the waiting list, it will probably not occur until September/October 2006.

What to do at Jarrad St?

SHOULD Jarrad Street stay shut forever at the Sea View Golf Club?

Council wants residents' views on the matter and has posted full information on the Town website - including issues raised when the road was closed temporarily in 2003.

Since then, the golf club

has prepared a safety plan including warning signs and protective fences in some higher-risk areas. The present, four-year, temporary closure expires in August next year, and the club has asked it become permanent.

"Informed public com-

ment and debate is essential before Council takes any decisions," said CEO Steve Tindale. "We are asking everyone to study the facts, have their say, and submit comments by July 10."

According to Town staff, Council's options are to end the closure next year;

extend it temporarily for another four years; or advertise permanent closure under the Land Administration Act.

* Closure eliminates traffic over the course between Broome Street and Marine Parade. A small section from Broome St stays open, for access to the kindergarten, Sea View club and the oval.

STORMWATER WORK STARTS

EXTENSIVE water works are proposed in 2006/07, under the Town's plan to restore Cottesloe's groundwater aquifer. Two open sumps will be replaced by underground tanks (Marion St/ Ackland Way; Brixton/Jarrad Sts) and 70 drainage soak pits will be installed. Three ocean outfall pipelines at the southern end of Marine Parade will be closed.

Apply for Heritage Grant

OWNERS of properties on the State Register of Heritage Places are being encouraged to express an interest in the Heritage Council's grants programme. The programme is not run by Cottesloe, and is separate from the Town's own arrangements for heritage places.

During 2006/07 State grants of \$1 million will be available to fund conservation works, and conservation plans, for privately-owned places which are on the register, or eligible for registration. (Also, religious organisations with a conscientious objection to receiving Lotterywest funds can apply.) Minimum grant for works is \$20,000; for plans, \$3,000.

As announced last month, the Town won federal funding of \$782,000 for the Water Smart project. In all, the four-year plan is estimated at \$2.346m, and Cottesloe hopes for a State government contribution of up to one-third of the total.

Cottesloe had already planned to replace sumps in Margaret and Lyons Streets with soak pits. Sale of the Lyons Street property could pay our share of the Water Smart costs.

Ultimately, the plan will enrich the shallow groundwater aquifer by eliminating 10 ocean outfalls and diverting all stormwater to the aquifer. Town staff point out that without government help it might have taken 15 years to complete the work, and with climate change and poor management of the resource that could be too late.

YOUR COMMENTS HEARD

Dog Beach remains

IN MAY, Council asked for residents views on the northern beach as a dog exercise area. Of the 35 residents who responded, 14 favour more dog-access, and 21 are against.

Council has decided to maintain the status quo; dogs are allowed on the beach at all times, EXCEPT from 10am-4pm, November 1 to March 31. (Public interest appears to have declined markedly since 1998, when the dog beach was last

debated by Council. Then, 115 letters, and two petitions with hundreds of signatures were received.)

Foreshore Vision excites comment

TOWN staff will report within six months on how Cottesloe might draw on the Foreshore Vision Master Plan, which was privately funded and prepared by resident Andrew Forrest. Comments on the Vision were made by 102 residents, during consultation on the Town Planning Scheme. Their comments are equally balanced, on matters such as underground parking, the rugby park, a beach pool, the jetty and parking in general. Summaries of these public submissions are available in the minutes of Council's May meeting, which can be accessed via the website. Council thanked the Vision's authors for their work and undertook to involve the whole community in exploring the merits of its proposals.
