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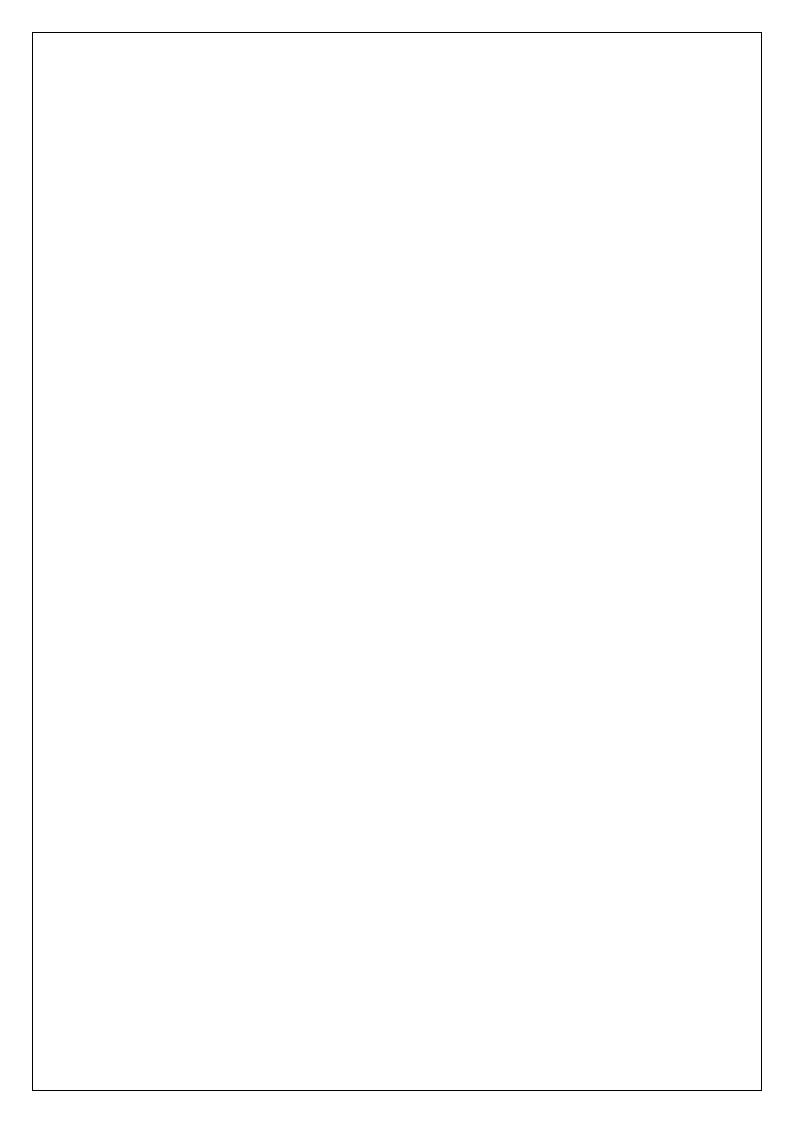


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1 DECLARATION OF MEETING OPENING/ANNOUNCEMENT OF VISITORS

SUMMARY

OFFICER COMMENT

The Town of Cottesloe has a number of consultations underway this year for a wide range of projects, care needs to be taken that the Town is not over consulting the Cottesloe community, risking consultation fatigue.

It should be noted that the current Beach Access Paths project for S10, S12, N6 and N7 is now complete and is now subject to a 12 month defects liability period.

At this stage it would be more appropriate and cost effective to monitor usage and attend to any issues as they arise.

There are many ways in which the Town and the Committee can ensure all concerns are brought to the attention of the relevant officers for action;

- Contacting the Town directly by phone or email
- Online service request/complaint forms
- Through their Elected Member
- The app. Snap, Send Solve

- How will the community be made aware of the outcomes of their feedback?

The Committee needs to ensure the answers to these questions form part of any accompanying survey literature and are clearly communicated, by the Committee to the Administration prior to the development of the consultation plan.


1. Could you please advise what the white pipe is at N6?

The white piping in the pictures below located at N6 is a reticulation piping.



2. Here is the existing small concrete area that provides a transition between Marine Pde and the pedestrian path. As said in my previous email (below) the Softworks plan shows the existing sand area either side of the path (with blue flags) that I understand will not be concreted.

Correct this will be planting, no additional concrete is being added to the crossover and the blue flags are the reticulation markers

Thank you for your email (below) 12 March 2019 with attached softworks drawings for N6 and N7 Beach Access Paths.

At the last BAP Committee Meeting 6 March 2019, I introduced an Agenda Item regarding the reticulation and planting of the strip bounded by Marine Pde, pedestrian path, N6 and N7 and I recall you advised Committee Members that this would be a grassed area.

Attached is a marked up drawing showing the extent of the existing grassed verge to remain. I have also overlayed the N6 and N7 plans showing the extent of native planting at each node.

CCA representative and Committee Member Mike Ewing and I questioned the "water wise" sense of reticulating this strip, confirming that any planting of coastal species in this strip would likely be trampled by people traversing the vegetation to access pedestrian path.

I understood through the BAP Committee's questions and discussion that this strip would be grass.

1. Can you please confirm that the subject strip, denoted on the attached N6 plan as a "PLANTED AREA WITH MULCH (IRRIGATED)", will be planted with grass or coastal species?

Native planting is nominated for the verge where planting is shown on the drawings.

I recall at the N6 "Site Inspection" held 19 January 2019, that there was discussion regarding a decrease in the concrete transition area between Marine Pde and the pedestrian path at N6. I understand that it was agreed to reduce this concrete area (as shown on the ECOSPACE plan) and leave this small section of path as it has been for many years. The reasoning was to keep concrete surface area to a minimum and maximise green space.

2. Can you please confirm that the planting either side of the short concrete "entrance path" from Marine Pde to the pedestrian path (as shown on attached N6 plan) will be the same concrete area as currently exists on site?

This is correct the pedestrian crossover is not being widened as per the onsite discussions

The N6 plan (attached) shows an increase in concrete area either side of this subject short section of path.

Discussion Summary

Cr Pyvis thanked Mr Kevin Truscott, Project Manager for providing the answers to the queries outlined above.

The Committee then discussed the items briefly including the following points:

- Minimising concrete at N7 permeable surface under the bike rack
- Concrete reduction discussions from previous meeting

Cr Pyvis requested an update from Mr Truscott related to the planting/reticulation of the strip of vegetation between the west side of Marine Parade and the pedestrian path.

Mr Truscott and CEO Mr Humfrey provided the following information:

- The area has been replanted (between the N6 and N7 grassed area) and new reticulation put in which can be turned off as required
- The planting was done specifically by community request to shield the access path from Marine Parade

The committee discussed the update at length including the following comments made by committee members:

- Committee did not endorse any planting along there
- Planting to minimise visual impact was discussed
- Grass in the space previously
- Maintain the water wise approach of the Town
- Using stabilised couch grass in the space not suitable for native planting
- Traffic in the area both pedestrian and vehicles

Subject: Re: Cottesloe Beach Access

Having been a Cottesloe home owner and resident for 26 years I am concerned by the recent developments to beach stairways North of the North Cottesloe Surf Club.

The concrete blocks which have been placed at the entry point to the new stairs, plus the single one at the Grant Street entry together with a number of other blocks where I understand the new Grant Street shower will be located are so unattractive. They do not blend into the current limestone sea theme, nor do they make a positive entry statement. I would like to know what vision the Cottesloe Council has for these concrete blocks and would appreciate the publication of a pictorial image. The Post would be the most suitable place to give Cottesloe ratepayers a clear understanding of the final design.

On another proposal by the Cottesloe Council to remove the number one carpark, I would appreciate a clear understanding about where the Council believes the overflow of cars will park. During Sculpture By the Sea this year I noticed cars were parking down as far as Curtin Avenue. As I walk the coast almost daily and see how valued this carpark is I assume the Council has an alternative idea in mind. There is nothing on the Cottesloe Council website and I never seem to get a written response to emails. Perhaps the Council could share this vision as well.

9.1 COMMITTEE MEMBERS

1. Cr Pyvis asked Mr Kevin Truscott – Project Manager for an explanation about the process of the Defects List with the recently completed works on beach access paths S10, S12, N6 and N7, and what the role of the Project Manager is in this regard.

Mr Truscott provided the following information:

- Defects will be notified to Mr Kotai Ecoscape and the contractor
- Follow up and ensure defects are rectified

The CEO, Mr Mat Humfrey advised the inspections of the works is undertaken in 3 stages; at the completion of the work, at the 6 month mark and a final prior to the end of the defects liability period.

Cr Pyvis asked what had been done about the issues already noted such as the incorrect orientation of shower head and the timeline for correction. Mr Truscott advised that all items had been corrected bar N7 which will be rectified/completed by the end of April.

2. Cr Pyvis raised an email sent by a beach user relating to S10, concerned about the erosion at the bottom of the path, noting that the CEO had responded to advise of a Coastcare lead planting program. Cr Pyvis asked Mr Truscott for an update on this.

Mr Truscott advised

- that the situation was in hand, referring to the Manger of Engineering Services, Mr Shaun Kan's email response (15 April 2019) to Cr Pyvis' previous enquiry.
- It is expected the works will happen in 2019 with Coastcare.

CEO Mr Humfrey advised the following:

- Not all planting has been done some still to go
- The town now has 2 full time staff working with Coastcare in regards to dune management and will monitor
- There is little that can be done to stop people jumping over fences and running alongside the path

The committee discussed the planting works at length.

3. Ms Kerryn Briody requested the **Beach Access Paths Committee Charter** be included for discussion in the next meeting agenda.



Hi Kevin

Looking at the cost for soil conditioner, mulch and tubestock it is around \$13.00 a sqm for the planting irrigation excluded. This assumes irrigation will be similar in cost and has not already been installed/ needs modification so is cost neutral.

I'll stress that grass planting in these areas is a departure from the approved design and will be noticed by the committee/ community- especially at N7 where Cr. Pyvis insisted that planting would be along the verge next to the showers to provide a buffer with the road.

There would also need to be removal of vegetation on the mound and a concrete edge installed which is an additional expense.
