ERIC STREET CYCLE PATH CONCEPT – HAVE YOUR SAY

As the Town progresses the State and Local Government joint project, the Long Term Cycle Network (LTCN), we are now asking for feedback from our community on the Eric Street Cycle Path Concept.

In 2018, the Cottesloe community was consulted on a Long Term Cycle Network (LTCN) for the Town and in April 2020, Council unanimously supported the LTCN plan which had been endorsed by the State Government in the same year.

A path on Eric Street was deemed one of the higher priorities from the 2018 public consultation survey. This route will provide secondary connection to the Perth to Fremantle Principle Shared Path (PSP) along Curtin Avenue, to North Cottesloe Primary School, and to the Cottesloe foreshore and surrounding businesses. The Town has identified the southern side of Eric Street (Marine Parade to Curtin Avenue) as the preferred location for an off-road shared path facility.

The Town of Cottesloe is committed to increasing our urban tree canopy and we will soon be commencing the 2021 Street Tree Winter Planting program. Trees being planted are in line with the Town's Street Tree Policy and Street Tree Masterplan which outlines tree species for our streets. The Town's hard working outdoor crew will mark out the location of all new trees with a peg. If you see a peg in your verge please do not remove it, a tree will be planted in that location very soon.
