Two beach wheelchairs for Cottesloe **Beach**

COTTESLOE has once more supported an initiative by the Town's Disability Services Committee to create easier beach access for people with disabilities.

Two special wheelchairs will be provided at a total cost of \$10,000. One of these, with large pneumatic tyres, is designed for easier movement on sand.

The other uses a paddlewheel system and allows users to be taken into the ocean, to swim from the

Sea View needs repairs

Faults at the building were discovered when it was assessed for planned improvements, which will be pre-funded by the Town and the club's current loan from the Town will be extended for the club to pay back its share over time.

Cottesloe will not be submitting an Amalgamation proposal to LGAB

COTTESLOE Council's motion for a five-part merger with Claremont, Mosman Park, Nedlands and Peppermint Grove, which was agreed at its February 24 meeting, has been countermanded.

This was done with a rescission motion at the March 24 Council meeting, and followed community concern which resulted in a public Meeting of Electors two days later.

All Council members attended the Electors Meeting, which drew around 150 residents and other interested individuals.

Motions

Three motions were passed at the meeting. They

 That Council hold a referendum of all residents with the question 'Do you want Cottesloe to remain an independent Council?';

That Cottesloe Council

remains an independent Council; and

• That Cottesloe Council request a meeting of WES-ROC to consider joint legal action in relation to the Minister's Reform Agenda.

Motions passed at an Electors Meeting are not binding on the Town Council, but they must be considered by the Council at its next meeting.

Opening the meeting, Mayor Jo Dawkins said it provided the opportunity to talk through the very important issue of local Government Reform.

Cottesloe had voted for the G5 council because it would be preferable to the G7 proposal by WA's Local Government Minister, she

"The State Government has handled the whole amalgamation debate poorly. It has been a moving feast dragged out over a long period of time, which has created uncertainty, anger and a lack of understanding of the process.

"There has been no cost analysis; no financial or social benefits have been given. It leaves most of us wondering - why?"

The Mayor explained that the February motion for a G5 was not a 'trick' but an attempt to meet the March 13 deadline for submissions to the Local Government Advisory Board.

"Whilst remaining independent has always been preferable the Minister is committeed to the reform process. G5 was considered a viable alternative for Cottesloe, rather than have no say, be excluded from the decision making process and be landed with a G7.

"We discussed this with the Towns of Cambridge and Mosman Park, which had independently come to

the same conclusion – that a G5 was the best outcome that would be acceptable to both Cottesloe residents and to the LGAB.

'After residents' reaction to the G5 concept I realised that the community was not with us. I take full responsibility for that – and the Council has now rescinded the February motion.'
