News in Brief ...

A REPORTED increase in numbers of gas-cylinders - such as those used for domestic barbecues found in waste and recycling bins has prompted a safety warning to residents.

They can explode, causing serious injuries.

It is strictly prohibited to dispose of gas cylinders in any bin.

Instead, you can refill or exchange them with distributors; or take them to the Brockway Road transfer station.

There, residents can dispose of up to three cyinders free.

AN application for an unrestricted liquor licence at the North Cott SLSC is not supported by the Council, it has advised the Dept of Racing, Gaming and Liquor.

The Council heard from local residents, concerned at the potential for regular late-night functions were an unrestricted licence granted.

After extensive councillor discussion, it was pointed out that the club could make an alternative application to the licensing authority.

WA hasn't hosted a Davis Cup tie since Australia beat Morocco at Kings Park in 2004. Second only to the USA, with 28 titles won in this tournament, our players have a proud history to live up to when they meet Uzbekistan.

Parking

Visitors

With up to 5,000 visitors a day expected, the Town is making every effort to facilitate the cup tie while minimising local disruption over the three-day event -September 12-14.

Cottesloe has proved itself fully capable of handling large numbers, during events such as the Rottnest Channel Swim and Sculpture by the Sea, which attracts 9,000 per day or more.

Special arrangements for the Davis Cup will include some road closures and changed parking facilities over the three days. Car Park 2 is close to the CTC and its 500 bays will take the bulk of visitor parking.

Parts of the Civic Centre will be used for administration, media, volunteers and VIP parking.

Public transport will be encouraged and a shuttle system to and from Cottes-

loe station is being considered.

Because of the need to bring heavy equipment and infrastructure to the CTC, and considerable pedestrian traffic between the club and the Civic Centre, Napier Street will be closed, between Broome Street and the Centre's western boundary, from September 10-15.

During peak hours the closure will briefly extend to Marine Parade, with residents given permits to bypass the road-blocks.

More courts

CTC has Council support for its development and expansion application to the WA Planning Commission.

The club plans to expand west into John Black Dune Park, which adjoins the club, to provide additional courts and meet increasing demand.

At the same time, a landscape concept plan for John Black Dune Park is being carried out by the Town, with input from Coastcare, and includes the probability of a buffer area between CTC and the park.

News in Brief ... **Beach Policy** for review

COTTESLOE'S ten-year old Beach Policy is to be reviewed, in light of the many changes to beach usage that have developed during the past decade.

This follows the Beaches and Beach Reserves Local Law, which was adopted in 2012 with removal of several redundant clauses.

Budget keeps rates down

RATE increases have been held to 4.1 per cent, despite big increases in State charges, where the landfill levy and electricity costs alone have added 0.8 per cent.

Town centre improvement of Napoleon Street is one of the major projects in Cottesloe's 2014-15 budget.

The refurbishment concept plans were enthusiastically received when Council staff presented them to a very well-attended and upbeat meeting with Procott, which represents town centre businesses.

Community benefits

Local community groups have benefitted from this year's budget. A call for applications

resulted in requests for almost \$80,000. In all, 14 groups will

receive Town donations, ranging from \$500 to \$5000.

The Playgroup will buy new toys, relocate to and furnish new premises, and design a nature garden. Seaview also plans a 'na-ture playscape' garden; Cott Primary will put their \$5,000 towards a 50m bike track in its kindergarten; and the RSL's grant will fund one-third the cost of the centenary book project 'Not Just a Name in Gold'.


Sustainability
