

Wise men see signs!

SOME of the Town's own wise men – the Foreshore Working Group – have seen the signs, and found them wanting! Over the years many different styles and systems have been employed to point, advise, and even cajole us all into following the right path.

It's time for some rationalisation they say, and the Council agrees.

Now there will be a survey of Cottesloe's signage, particularly along the beach foreshore. Reducing signs to a minimum is one of the aims, especially where two or three of them warn of the same hazard! Some free-standing signs might be replaced with painted markings on roads, paths and curbs. Others might be fixed to existing structures, such as light poles. 'A uniform design and lay-out to produce elegant, restrained and appropriate signage for a sea-side location' is the aim, and results of the survey will be reported to the Council in the New Year.



Keeping the Grove cool!

COTTESLOE will ensure the new Grove Library remains cool, and useable through the predicted long hot summer by contributing to the cost of a new re-injection bore. This is an essential part of the system that provides air-conditioning to the contemporary building.

Problems have been identified with the operation of the injection bore. Partners in the library project (Mosman Park, Peppermint Grove and Cottesloe) have agreed that while recovery of costs will be pursued, in the meantime the air-conditioning element must work properly. A new bore is estimated to cost \$147,000, and the Town of Cottesloe will contribute \$60,000. Part of this will be met by savings made on the original project, which came in under budget.

Safety on the roads

ROAD work at the Curtin Avenue/Eric Street intersection is on hold as a 'reserve' project for Federal Blackspot funding in 2012/2013. Although Main Roads offered partial State assistance towards the \$276,000 project, the Town has opted to wait on the possibility of full funding by the Commonwealth.

Originally, Cottesloe requested funding of three Black Spot projects: Curtin/Eric was the only one approved by Main Roads.

Traffic calming

The flow and speed of vehicles along Broome Street will be monitored once more over the next six months. Calming equipment was removed after objections from residents, who also raised doubts that speeding on the street was a problem.

Suggested solutions including a roundabout on Broome Street (at Loma St) or blister islands have been deferred pending staff monitoring.

At the same time, the Council has approved installation of a red asphalt speed plateau at the Railway/Napoleon Sts intersection.

The Council has agreed to proceed with road safety improvement works at the intersection of Marine Parade and Napier Street and to a pedestrian crossing island on Broome St at the

northern end of the tennis courts.

Improvements

Approximately one year ago WA Main Roads funding for a 'seagull' island design to deal with a problem at the Mann Street/Grant St intersection was abandoned after local residents' objections. Alternative solutions are still being considered and the Council has reiterated the need to continue researching better methods to ensure safety at this intersection.

The Cat's back!

UNTIL March 25 the FREE Cott Cat is the smart way to traverse the Town. Following a route from Cottesloe station to Marine Parade, the service will run on Saturday and public holiday (except Christmas Day), every 15 minutes 10.30am – 5pm.

On Sundays the hours are 10.30am to 11pm.

New Year

On New Year's Eve a special service will run – every 15 minutes between 10.30am and 1am, thanks to the generous support of the public Transport Authority.

During Sculpture by the Sea, in March, the Cat will operate EVERY day.

Surfies to give extra beach service!

COTTESLOE SLSC already provides a wonderful service on the beach and now they're set to extend it at three big public events.

Provided there is no objection from event organisers, the club has Council go-ahead for a (non-alcoholic) drinks service on the sands during Sculpture by the Sea, and at the Rottnest Channel Swim and the Havaiana Thong Challenge.

It's a way for the club to

raise funds, and public awareness of its work.

Hot drinks on the beach will be especially welcomed by the Rottnest swimmers, who assemble on the beach from 4.30am! At the other events the club will establish a mobile soft drinks caravan in a suitable spot.

WEDDING ceremonies in Grant Marine Park have been approved by the Council. Residents in the immediate area will be notified of events, which are limited to no more than 100 guests. The move responds to several recent requests from couples wanting to pledge their vows in the oceanside park. Ceremonies will be limited to just one hour, and as well as restrictions on guest numbers, no catering or entertainment will be allowed.
