

New Place Names within the Town of Cottesloe

Name	Location	Reason
Kiln	Main road of the new development at the Town's former depot site (2B Nailsworth Street)	In recognition of the site's former use as a quarry.
Drayton	The development at the Town's former depot site (2B Nailsworth Street)	In recognition of a former rectory at 40 Napier Street and a church camp located at 2B Nailsworth Street. Kenneth Drayton rescued St Philips church from closure and went on to be one of its most successful parish priests and community builders.
Fahey	The development at the Town's former depot site (2B Nailsworth Street)	In recognition of a former rectory at 40 Napier Street and a church camp located at 2B Nailsworth Street. John Fahey was a Chaplin during WW1 & bore the brunt of the pastoral duties in Gallipoli. Served at St Mary's Church Star of the Sea in Cottesloe.
Angelo	The development at the Town's former depot site (2B Nailsworth Street)	In recognition of a former rectory at 40 Napier Street and a church camp located at 2B Nailsworth Street. Mary Angelo was integral in the establishment of St Philips Church & North Cottesloe Primary School. Angelo also advocated for the spiritual wellbeing and education of local children.
Wisdom	Vicinity of the Civic Centre	Evan Wisdom was a former Cottesloe Mayor. Wisdom also played a leadership role throughout the Gallipoli campaign, where he was awarded the Distinguished Service Order.
Haines	Vicinity of the Civic Centre	Octavius Haines was an inaugural member of the Cottesloe Roads Board.
Zimpel	In close proximity to John Street. Preferably the ROW north of John Street. (ROW 31A)	William Zimpel is said to be the first permanent resident of John Street. Pine Lodge (42 John Street) was designed for the Zimpel family.

Name	Location	Reason
Seadragon	ROW 62	Residents abutting the ROW expressed a preference for Seadragon. The ROW is located in close proximity to the coast.
		The first Seadragon specimen was washed up on Cottesloe Beach in 1919.
Boojak	In the vicinity of Fig Tree Lane	To group names for flora and fauna.
		Boojak is the Indigenous name for Banksia/Parrot Bush which grows in Cottesloe.
Panjang	In the vicinity of Fig Tree Lane	To group names for flora and fauna.
		Panjang is the Indigenous name for the wattle commonly called Dune Moses and grows in Grant Marine Park & near Vlamingh Memorial.
Spinifex	In the vicinity of Fig Tree Lane	To group names for flora and fauna.
		Spinifex is common along the Cottesloe dunes.
Templetonia	In the vicinity of Fig Tree Lane	To group names for flora and fauna.
		Templetonia occurs on limestone in Cottesloe Native Garden.
Kerbein	In the vicinity of Fig Tree Lane	To group names for flora and fauna.
		Kerbein is the Indigenous name for sword sedge which grows in Cottesloe.
Bunning	In the vicinity of Tukurua (9 Rosendo Street)	Tukurua was built by the Bunning brothers.
Wardung	In proximity to the coast	Wardung is the Indigenous name for the raven. Indigenous oral history states that Mudurup (or costal Cottesloe) was one of the traditional haunts of the Wardung.
Sunshine	In proximity to the corner of Avonmore Terrace and Salvado Street	Sunshine House/The Sunshine Home/Sunshine Lodge was located on the corner of Avonmore Terrace and Salvado Street.
		Country Womens Association used the house as a seaside holiday centre for women and children living in the country. During the Great Depression the CWA subsidised a number of women in need of a holiday.
Bakery	In close proximity to the corner of	A bakery & stables, owned by Thomas McKenna, was located at 64 Railway Street from 1927.

	Railway Street and Boreham Street	
Stable	In close proximity to the corner of Railway Street and Boreham Street	A stables & bakery, owned by Thomas McKenna, was located at 64 Railway Street from 1927. The horses were removed in 1984.
Sawkins	In close proximity to Napoleon Street	Walter Sawkins was Cottesloe's first newsagent, his business was located in Napoleon Street.
		Sawkins also served a member of Cottesloe Roads Board.
Loveland	In close proximity to 19 Perth Street	Nurse Loveland established a maternity hospital at 17-19 Perth Street in the 1920s.
Hummerston	In close proximity to 80 Railway Street (former Wanslea site)	
Delamare	Within the North Ward	Delamare's Silver Dale Dairy had grazing in lands in north Cottesloe up to Campbell Barracks in the early 1900s.
Zephyr	North of Forrest Street close to the coast	Zephyr is the name of a pleasure boat that berthed at the Cottesloe Jetty en route from Fremantle to Rottnest Island in the early 1900s. Also means light wind.
