



Lanes and **ROWs** to become **Crown land**

COTTESLOE has applied for all the lanes and Right of Ways owned by the Town to become Crown land, by having them dedicated as roads under the Land Administration Act (1997). They would all continue to be managed by Cottesloe.

At the same Council meeting last month, planning and traffic controls were approved for the precinct including McNamara Way, Joinery Way, Pennefather Lane and Clive Road. Due to restricted access from the highway the lanes have become used by vehicles as well as cyclists and pedestrians.

Indiana drinks

COTTESLOE Council has given in-principle support to the Indiana restaurant's licensing application that would allow patrons who wish to be served liquor at a table without having a meal, to be seated anywhere in the licensed area rather than in a restricted area. This type of Extended Trading Permit is already allowed and operating satisfactorily at some other local restaurants.

RTGs and Cottesloe

LOCAL councils continue debating possible amalgamations in the western sub-

In July, Mayor Kevin Morgan said that Cottesloe should remain 'pro-active and willing to participate and negotiate terms that we can put out for community feedback'.

Now, the Council has informed State government that, given conditions previously outlined, Cottesloe would be willing to join an RTG (Regional Transition Group) with Claremont, Mosman Park and Peppermint Grove.

Conditions

Cottesloe's terms for joining an RTG include:

How many Councillors? Review to be made

SEPARATELY from the amalgamation debate, Cottesloe has to report to State government our preferred approach to local wards and councillor representation.

The Council has indicated a preference for four wards and a directly-elected Mayor – as at present – but with eight councillors instead of ten.

The Town is required to give local public notice that a review is to be carried out and a discussion or information paper will be prepared to outline the various options and explain the factors against which the options will be assessed. Maps clearly showing the current ward situation and possible options will be included in the paper. After the consultation period a report will be prepared for Council consideration prior to the report being sent to the Local Government Advisory Board.
