Average rate increase will be 8.5 per cent

THE average Cottesloe household rate will increase by 8.5 per cent this financial year. Reduced revenues, increasing costs and extra costs due to increased State government charges (including power and landfill levy) have all made a contribution to the final figure.

Town staff Councillors held and three workshop/ briefing sessions to hammer out a draft budget, which was endorsed by a special Council meeting last Monday (July 6.)

Teams struggle to beat the weather

CONTRACTORS Kulin Group are pressing on with the Cottesloe Beach Pylon restoration despite several storms and high seas that have hindered them.

The last progress report shows they have managed to lift the column to a near vertical alignment and hold it in place with a steel gantry and chains. The concrete base section has been cut back to good quality concrete and solid steel reinforcing.

Holes have been drilled in the base to line up with matching holes in the column and steel reinforcing rods have been concreted into both sections, connecting the column into the base to finish the re-installation.

A steel reinforcing cage has been assembled and will be connected to the existing steel reinforcing in the base. Then a new concrete ring section will be poured on the top of the base to further lock in the column to prevent any future movement or collapse.

New federal grant for Town

MAYOR Kevin Morgan joined more than 650 delegates from councils across Australia attending the National General Assembly of Local Governments in June, to discuss critical issues confronting councils and their local communities. The issues that were raised at the assembly included constitutional reform, climate change, community infrastructure and local government financing.

At the assembly Prime Minister Kevin Rudd announced additional funding of \$220 million for the Community Infrastructure Program (CIP) to be made available in 2009/10. This will add to the previous investment in the CIP and add up to more than \$1 bil-

The Town of Cambridge was first to test the concept of bringing schools together to collaborate on sustainability and in 2009 it was broadened by the environment team of WESROC (Western Suburbs Regional Organisation of Councils). The aim is to encourage schools in the western suburbs to discuss sustainability issues and projects in the hope of achieving real environmental benefits for all of them.

The network will look to support administrators, teachers, and school communities in education activities and events that encourage sustainable behaviour in schools and the broader community.

Local government officers will provide support to schools – by way of funding – such as Sustainable Schools Grants; provision of curriculum resources such as Waterwise K-10 materials; and/or learning opportunities - such as planting days). "The first session includ-

ed a presentation about the 'Waterwise Schools' pro-gramme, and how schools

can get involved, while allowing time for discussion between schools and councils," said Cottesloe's sustainability officer, Jade Hankin.

"This allowed the schools to provide inspiration to each other about current projects and to show where assistance might be provided by the local councils, and other bodies."

Meetings will be held each term, moving around the council areas and schools, presenting different topics for discussion. Next meeting is planned for mid August at the International School of Western Australia (in City Beach) where the focus will be on waste issues.
